

IT'S FALL Y'ALL!

This is my favorite time of year - cooler temps (usually), lower humidity (usually), and so many photo ops (all season long). Pumpkin patches and apple picking, fall festivals, haunted houses and trick-or-treaters, family gatherings (think backyard bonfires for something fun to photograph), fall sports, colorful landscapes, festive foods, candle lit still life or autumnal flat lay, your neighbors' porch decorations, farmers' markets . . so many things to capture. And that's just for a start in October.

When November comes around I switch gears from fun to gratitude. A favorite past project I have enjoyed is a Gratitude Photo Book. The concept is very simple: Take one photo/day for 30 days of what you are thankful for.

I recently did a little research on sharing how gratitude and photography can be used together. I believe the article I enjoyed most came from the online Greater Good Magazine: Science Based Insights for a Meaningful Life.

The subject in this article included being mindful (a state of open awareness and attention) and to feel gratitude (truly notice the good things in life). An eight-week photography curriculum was created and used in an elementary school project.

Their project manual states: "One can say photography is a physical manifestation of mindfulness. It is about stopping/pausing, observing, framing, focusing, and capturing/receiving ... Basically, photography is about a relationship to the present moment. Relating to the present moment with joy and gratitude is a choice we can make."

We often rush through our busy lives without truly noticing or appreciating all the beauty that surrounds us. The creators of this program found mindful photography as a creative way to cultivate focus, deep seeing, and gratitude that both students and adults can carry with them into the rest of their lives. 

AI-Generated Images

Maybe you missed it, but German artist Boris Eldagsen entered the Sony World Photography Awards – the creative open category. His awardwinning photo is pictured to the right.

Eldagsen, according to The Guardian, revealed on his website that he was not accepting the prize, admitting to being a "cheeky monkey." He used artificial intelligence to generate the image. Eldagsen says that his entry was designed to provoke debate and to find out if competitions would be prepared for Al images to enter.

"They are not," he added. He further stated that AI was not photography. To read the entire article, click **here**.

Prior to reading this article, I was "invited" by Bing to try its new Al-generated "images." Specifically, to "create art from words with AI." OK, I'll bite. I was looking for a Halloween image that included a boat and was not finding anything interesting using my usual search techniques, so I decided to try it.

Image Creator generates AI images based on your text. This is an incredibly cool option for pictures and graphics to enhance your website and publications.

On the next page is one of the four images created with the phrase "orange Halloween pumpkins skeletons in a boat impressionism." Very spooky!

It may take you a while to get the hang of the phraseology to get the desired result. I am sure they are trying to hook you on this technology and will want to start charging for it later! LOL Click here to learn more and to see examples of the type of phrase needed to create the sample image (scroll over the image).



So, this begs the question, unless the photographer tells us, how can we know if an image is Al-generated? Scientific American says it is "next to impossible to detect." And as the Al gets more sophisticated, the harder it will become. Even another Al program may not be able to detect its use because the images are generated by programs using different algorithms. Most Al detectors also lack user-friendly interfaces.

This does not mean we should stop trying. Some suggest that social media platforms need to begin to confront Al-generated content on their websites because they are in a better position to do so.

And we humans need to be more skeptical in evaluating visual information. Seeing is no longer believing. Click here to read this article.

Actually, when you look at the metadata on both these images – properties/details/camera datanothing shows. I would assume that means it was not taken with a camera of any sort. When you are just looking at an image on a website, social media site, or on paper—there isn't really a good way to tell if it is Al-generated.

Something else interesting, did you know that a work of art created by artificial intelligence without any human input cannot be copyrighted under U.S. law, a U.S. court in Washington, D.C. has ruled. But what if a human took the Algenerated art and manipulated it? What then?

So, what might that mean for the Coastal Photo

Club? Should we have a new category for our photo contests? Should every person who enters our photo contests be required to state that the image is not Al-generated? What if the image started out as Al-generated and then the member used their skills to further enhance it with one of the photo processing programs? Is that just a manipulated photo?

This topic will be a lively source of discussion for some time to come as these AI generators take over more and more of the photo and literary worlds. Could this be the next CPC contest category?



Rating Your Photos

You've just shot dozens of photos - maybe hundreds - and you know you've captured some great images. You upload the images into your favorite editing software, but now you've got to sort through all those photos to find those shots you were excited about. There must be a faster, more efficient way. Fortunately, there is.

Many, if not most, cameras in use today offer a feature that allows users the option to rate images while reviewing them in playback mode. On my Nikon D500 DSLR (pictured), for example, I can rate a photo from 1-5 stars, or leave it unrated.


Now, when I import those photos into my editing software (I use Adobe Bridge), I can sort them by rating, thus making it quick and easy to find the images I want.

Let me offer a real life example. It's halftime at a basketball game, and I've shot about 250-300 images. My client wants eight quality shots - four from the home team and four from the visiting team - to post online before the start of the second half. I've got about 10 minutes to get this done.

Fortunately, I've been rating my photos during timeouts, assigning my best shots of the home team five stars and best shots of the visitors four stars. Now when I upload the photos and open Adobe Bridge (or Lightroom, etc.), I can sort the photos by rating and quickly find the photos I need to send the client.

Welcome to the club, Anders.


